4. **PRESENTATIONS**

A. Kindergarten Transition Camp, Elementary Staff:

The elementary staff (Susie Rice, Amy Farney, Michaela Rice & Shauna R. Rice) presented about the Kindergarten Transition Camp that took place for 3 weeks over the summer (July 10-27). This program was for incoming Kindergarteners. There were 30 students that signed up and the average daily attendance was 22 students. Prior to Pre-K,

a Building Bridges program was held each spring for incoming Kindergarteners. Parents would bring their child once a week in the evening for 4 weeks. Parents would attend this program with their child while children engaged in hands-on activities. This program was stopped when the Pre-K program began at Beaver River in 2013. The Kindergarten Transition Camp was very well attended, but was not mandatory, children could attend when they were available. The teachers did 3 different themes for the 3-week program so that each child could interact with all kids and adults. The students did several activities throughout the morning which included: free time, calendar time, lessons involving ELA and Math activities that revolved around the weekly themes, center time with hands on centers, dramatic play areas where students could role play, art projects and the day ended with snack time and outdoor play. The goal of having this summer transition camp was for kindergarteners to have a routine when entering kindergarten. The teachers formed relationships with the students which was beneficial for the first week of school. Seeing a familiar face when coming to school for the first time was very beneficial for many of the students. Also this program was beneficial for the teachers. They were able to meet these students and learn some strategies to utilize throughout the day and made them more aware of the needs of the incoming kindergarteners that did not attend Pre-K or Head Start.

B. Eliza Boliver, CSE Chairperson & Carolyn Widrick, Special Education Teacher:

Carolyn Widrick, Special Education teacher presented on Disability Awareness Month. Something to consider when getting our students Real World Ready. She talked about the bulletin board in the hallway about "If all you see is a disability, you will miss"... This bulletin board shows puzzle pieces of what you would miss if all you see is a disability. For instance, talented, exceptional, hard working students that are all in our classrooms and hallways everyday trying to be accepted by all of our students. Mrs. Widrick emailed a video to the staff last year and also presented the same video to the Board. This video sparked some interest in one ELA class and this teacher had one of her classes become pen pals to Mrs. Widrick's students. Mrs. Widrick had done weekly informational announcements and also various posters to increase awareness to disabilities. Mrs. Widrick would like to hold spirit weeks in March for different disability days. To get all students and staff involved with the 13 students she has in her class this year. Elena Dickinson, BOE Student Representative stated that this would be a good thing for the Big Brothers and Big Sisters group here at Beaver River.

Eliza Boliver, CSE Chair presented on the trend in Special Education. Preschool Special Education numbers compared to the last few years have increased some with a total of 18 students so far this year. Section 504 has increased to a 7.45% compared to last year 7.00% with a total of 65 students with a 504 plan. Special Education number have increased to 171 students with an IEP plan. We also have homeschool and River Valley students who also received special education services. With that being said we have approximately 254 students out of 872 total (Pre-K through 12th grade) students receiving some form of special education services in the district. The initial/triennial evaluations which include, testing, scoring, interpretation, collaboration, report writing and meetings would take 10 hours per evaluation. We are noticing a increase in needs beginning in preschool. Also the lack of space has become a factor with special programs that are full with waiting lists. We are out of space in our building to adapt to the increase in needs.

C. Kimberly Lyman-Wright, Elementary Principal

Dr. Lyman-Wright presented on RTI & DI which is Response to intervention and differentiated instruction. The process for Beaver River is to give instruction to all through guided reading and universal testing. Academic Intervention Services and Special Education Services are to supplement to those students who need the extra support. The total referrals for special education or 504 plans has increased tremendously in the PreK-5th grade classes since the 2019-2020 school year. The elementary academic goal is to provide learning opportunities for all students to enjoy reading, receive applicable support and explicit instruction. Our elementary objectives are to implement explicit instruction in all academic areas, develop a multitiered system of support model (MTSS) and to decrease the number of CSE referrals in grades K-2. So what is MTSS (multitiered systems of support) this is a term used to describe a framework that "houses" triangular intervention service delivery modes. These intervention service delivery models seek to remediate maladaptive learning, behavioral, or social-emotional deficits before they lead to disability placement, office discipline referrals, significant social-emotional concerns, or even

criminal conduct. MTSS is utilized to promote uniformity across schools, provide early intervention to students, abide by state guidelines, and recognize that academic, behavioral and social-emotional difficulties tend to be interconnected and often do not operate independently of one another. Four critical elements of MTSS are 1. varying levels of preventative evidence-based supports and instructional practices 2. universal screening 3. progress monitoring 4 data-based decision making Our next steps are data will help the team of teachers who are attending the MTSS training create an implementation plan for the 2024-2025 school year. We will be able to monitor how the PreK programs are identifying students early before coming to kindergarten for early intervention. We can know if this years CSE referrals from K-2 are lower, the same or higher than the years prior to this year. Kim will provide follow up data at the March meeting with IST referrals for the 2023-2024 school year and then at the June meeting have the MTSS plan for the 2024-2025 school year and final IST referrals for the 2023-2024 school year.

D. Troy Hebert, Middle & High School Assistant Principal

Mr. Hebert presented on our McKinney-Vento an ELL programs. These are both federal programs that fall under ESSA. McKinney-Vento is part of Title I and ELL is covered under Title III. Currently, we have 4 English Language Learner(ELL) students enrolled in the district. All of the current students are enrolled in the elementary. This number is up from last year and we suspect that the number of ELL students will continue to rise in the coming months and years. Upon enrollment, students who are identified as ELL are assessed through a NYSITELL test to determine their level of English language proficiency. Students then receive additional instruction based on their NYSITELL score. This instruction is either 1 ½ or 3 hours per week of ELL instruction to help these students master the language. Currently, we provide extra assistance using our own staff and tutors provided through the Regional Bilingual Network as we have not yet been able to hire an English teacher as a new Language Teacher. McKinney-Vento is designed to help homeless students. This act states that children and youth who lack "a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence" will be considered homeless. We have around 10 students currently experiencing homelessness in one form or another. McKinney-Vento eligible students have the right to: enroll in school immediately, even if lacking documents for enrollment; continue attending the school of origin; receive transportation; receive educational services according to their needs and receive free school meals. Students are normally identified as homeless when families complete the registration paperwork, but sometimes the guidance office informs us of housing changes. One of the greatest challenges we face is the transportation. This makes it difficult getting students to and from school when they live 20, 30 or more miles away.

E. Daniel Rains, Middle & High School Principal

Mr. Rains presented on the total number of students enrolled at the Howard G. Sackett Technical Center. We have a total of 38 juniors who attend the PM classes and a total of 41 senior students who attend the AM class. This enrollment would be roughly 60% of our junior and senior students attend the BOCES programs. Over the last few years, our percentages have increased. We had 37% of the class of 2021, 51% class of 2022 and 46% class of 2023 who have attended the BOCES programs.
